Encourage Students to Enter the 2022 N.C. Jr. Chef Competition

Get ready for the fifth statewide and second virtual N.C. Jr. Chef Competition! High school students enrolled in N.C. Career and Technical Education Culinary Arts and Hospitality, Food and Nutrition, or Food Science and Technology courses are encouraged to work with their Family Consumer Sciences teacher and local School Nutrition Program to create a school lunch entrée recipe that adheres to National School Lunch Program regulations, features at least two North Carolina grown ingredients and one USDA Foods item, and meets student taste preferences.

Applications with recipes, recipe photos, cost and nutrient analysis and permission forms are due January 26. Based on a review of applications and recipes received, up to eight finalist teams will be selected for the cook-off. For the virtual cook-off, teams will submit final applications with recipes, recipe photos, cost, and nutrient analysis along with a video of the teams preparing and plating their recipe and a time management plan for finishing the dish within the 90-minute time limit by March 2. Teams will participate in live virtual interviews March 22 or 23. All finalist teams will be recognized, and the competition results announced during the N.C. FCCLA State Leadership Conference March 30 and a virtual ceremony March 31. Student members of the top three teams will win scholarships to attend Sullivan University. The first-place team will advance to the Southeast Jr. Chef Competition for a chance to win a full scholarship. Legislative Update

We had a busy Fall in 2021 with our State Budget negotiations: we successfully achieved statutory relief on our Indirect Costs along with getting that much-needed new State Budget enacted. SNA-NC requested that our state statute be changed so that Indirect Costs would only be chargeable at a 3 months' operating balance (from the prior law at 1 month's operating balance). In the final budget, the General Assembly "split the difference" at a 2 months' operating balance being required before triggering any Indirect Costs and that, thankfully, is now law.

Additionally, SNA-NC successfully obtained this new sentence in that same state statute ("School food services" NC General Statute 115C-450):

"(c) No public school unit that provides school nutrition services shall assess an unrestricted indirect cost rate to a school nutrition program that is more than eight percent (8%)."

Significantly, prior NC guidance had allowed up to an eighteen percent (18%) Indirect Cost rate which risked bankrupting School Nutrition Programs (SNPs) and unfortunately did in some cases, as you know.

Thankfully, several other advocacy groups such as the NC PTA, the NC Medical Society, the NC Alliance for Health, among many others, supported this effort with the goal of ensuring sustainability and solvency in our SNPs; therefore, feeding students better. The collective efforts of our increasing groundswell of stakeholders working toward stronger SNPs together have been an ongoing priority that our Association has worked hard to achieve over the years. Your membership and your advocacy helped us make this happen and we need your involvement – and that of our SNP colleagues – now more than ever.

SNA-NC has much to be grateful for this year. If you have not yet thanked your NC Senator and NC Representative at the NC General Assembly, please do so today! District lines have gotten re-drawn so always check the General Assembly's website to find out who represents you. In 2022, all legislators will be up for re-election if they are running again, and it will be a time to get to know the candidates for office in your (possibly) re-drawn district.

In 2021, we had several other legislative items under consideration that included: 1) permanent (recurring) funding to offset the \$.40 reduced lunch cost; 2) state funding for our workers' hospitalization and retirement rates (i.e., benefits); and 3) increased minimum wages for our staff. These are all items that we will have to continue working on in 2022 as they were not funded in the 2021-22 budget.

One big item in 2021 was legislators' discussions about increasing the minimum wage for school staff (noncertified personnel). Unfortunately, the legislature did not appropriate State dollars in the 2021 budget for our SNP noncertified staff – the General Assembly typically views SNPs as their own independent "enterprise-funded" programs. Changing the hearts and minds of state leaders to appropriate state dollars for the estimated \$11.9 Million for us to get to \$13/hour and \$28.4 Million for us to get to \$15/hour will remain a big issue where we need your help. While the legislature did fund other school staff's increased wages to \$13/hour if they are State-funded positions, the legislature has not historically funded our SNP wage increases. We need your help and that of all SNP employees to help educate both our local and state leaders, whether school superintendents, county commissioners or state legislators, on the "Why" and "How" we need local and state dollars to supplement our highly trained and highly coveted SNP staff. Our staffing shortages and sustainability will continue to be top priorities in 2022. Your PP&L Committee along with our wonderful Lobbyist, Rachel Beaulieu, will continue to work on our SNA-NC legislative priorities during the 2022 Short Session of the NC General Assembly.



Breaking Ground: We were welcomed by Elizabeth C. Payne, Buncombe County Schools Nutrition Director and Chapter Advisor with our Thought of the Day, who passed the shovel to our BCS Superintendent, Dr. Tony Baldwin. Dr. Baldwin spoke of the importance of our School Nutrition department and expressed his appreciation for all we do and especially how it was magnified during the pandemic. Dr. Baldwin then passed the shovel onto Mrs. Susanne Swanger, BCS Associate Superintendent who praised all our efforts in preparing students to remain engaged during the school day, stating that a hungry mind cannot learn and retain educational instruction during the school day.

The Germination Phase (Begins the Sunflowers life): District VIII Director, Sheryl Harris, had the pleasure of introducing our SNA-NC President, Dana Edwards to address the group. Dana spoke on behalf of SNA NC, informed us of available awards and scholarships, and our PP&L update. Dana then had the pleasure of introducing our guest speaker. (During germination, roots develop from the seed and a shoot will push through the surface of the soil. The shoot is



looking for sunlight.)

The Vegetative Phase (Plant grows leaves) & The Reproductive Phase (The bud may have a star like appearance): What an honor and privilege it was for us to have Julie Pittman, Educator Engagement Special Advisor to NC Superintendent of Public Instruction at NCDPI, be with us to speak to the group. Julie brought her ray of sunshine by sharing her own personal experience, explaining the impact we have on our students and community by having the cafeteria as the heartbeat of the school. We are doing more than just feeding meals, we are feeding their minds, bodies, and souls to prepare them for the future. Her testimony and heartfelt presentation is a gentle reminder that we are all in the position to make lifelong choices that will impact a student. (During the vegetative phase of a sunflower's life, leaves begin to grow, and the plant needs to be watered regularly. If planted in poor soil, add a slow acting fertilizer. During the reproductive phase, you will see the star like appearance bud transform into a tall stemmed, yellow bloom)

The Blooming Phase (take advantage of yellow blooms): Having received plenty of sunlight and water to "our garden", we moved onto our Make It & Take It session. A special thank you to our BCS SNA Secretary/Treasurer Dana Nickloy for arranging this session. While creating our own sunflowers to take home, a great time of conversation and fellowship was had

while playing icebreaker bingo. (The blooming phase provides the opportunity for bees to pollinate the flower and fertilize the seeds!)

Harvesting Phase:

We concluded our afternoon with a meal and are re-energized to "Bloom into your Full Potential." A closing thought to all of our SNA members, in conjunction with our SNA-NC Presi-



dents theme: "Sunflowers symbolize strength, adoration and loyalty, so they'll have sentimental meaning to friends and family". Grow tall, grow strong, plant seeds, give water and care as needed.

MEMBERSHIP UPDATE

This past fall, in November 2021, the School Nutrition Association of NC has a remarkable 2,457 members. About 80% total membership is district owned. When comparing membership to prior year; in November 2020 we had 2,524 members.

Generally, membership trends show that membership numbers decline during the summer vacation months and winter and then bounces back in the fall and spring. Let's put an end to these trending declines and work to keep our membership numbers on the rise as we move through the winter months. Culinary Arts / Creative Arts Competition

Are you planning to enter the 2022 Culinary Arts and Creative Arts Competition in Greensboro?

At this time, we are planning for Culinary/Creative Arts registration packets to be available at the table outside of the Colony Room on the third floor of Koury Center. Only people who are participating in and judging the Culinary/Creative Arts competition will be allowed in the set-up area. We will have lots of volunteers to assist the ones entering. Please watch for the Spring 2022 Arrow for further details on set-up time, viewing, etc. You can contact Jamie Narron, Culinary/Creative Arts Chair at jamie.narron@wilsonschoolsnc.net with any questions.

Please follow the competition rules EXACTLY to avoid disqualifications. The biggest challenge judges face each year is contestants being disqualified. The major reason for disqualification is entering your item in the wrong category, missing recipe cards, using the incorrect theme or size for National School Lunch Week or National School Breakfast Week decoration, or simply not following the guidelines. Please make sure that you understand the requirements for the category you are entering. Please be sure to read all the instructions carefully and ask questions if something is not clear, prior to submitting your entry form. If you have questions, please email them to jamie.narron@wilsonschoolsnc.net.

All entries will be judged by professionals who understand the program. They will disqualify entries not meeting the requirements and rules of the competition. Disqualified entries will be identified with the reason for disqualification.

In order to lessen confusion, the K-5 Food Based Menu Planning approach will be used for the following categories: Lunch/Entrée Meal, Sandwich/Wrap Plate, Ethnic Plate, School Breakfast, Meat/Grain Entrée, Grab n Go/Second Chance Breakfast, Entrée Salad, Commodity Fruit, Commodity Vegetable, NCDA Farm to School Vegetable, Whole Grain Side Dish.

The K-5 meal pattern guidelines follow:

Mission Statement

The mission of the School Nutrition Association of North Carolina Culinary/Creative Arts Competition is to attractively display, and merchandise foods and creative decorations used in the operation of the North Carolina Child Nutrition Programs.

General Information for all Participants

- Participant must be a SNA-NC member and pre-registered for the SNA-NC Annual Conference.
- Entries must be in the name of an individual member. School entries are not permitted.
- Participant must register with the Culinary and Creative Arts Committee prior to set up. At that time, entrants will receive their instruction packets. Each participant is required to pick up his/her own instruction packet.
- Only participants will be allowed in the show area during set-up and preparation. Participants must leave the show area prior to judging time. Name badges and culinary participation ribbons should be worn at all times participants are in the Culinary/Creative Arts area.
- No materials should identify the exhibit/item as that of a specific individual, school, or school system. However, it is permissible to display supplier's name on food products such as milk containers or individually pre-packaged items as this is the typical way those items are utilized in the school cafeteria.
- Each entry will be given a number and judged by number not by personal identification.
- The SNA-NC Culinary and Creative Arts Competition Committee and the SNA-NC are NOT responsible for the loss or theft of any item or display.
- Entries may be sampled, touched, or otherwise handled.
- No prizes will be awarded to contestants who remove their entries before the specified competition viewing closing time.

Division I: Culinary Arts

5 Categories, 17 Competition Sub-Categories

- A. School Lunch or Breakfast Plate All entries should follow the K-5 Meal Pattern for 2021-2022 and must represent a complete reimbursable meal. Food components may be weighed or measured.
 - Lunch / Entrée Meal Meat entrée is served with appropriate fruit(s), vegetable(s), grain, and milk. Examples: BBQ Chicken, Oven Roasted Chicken, Pizza, Spaghetti, Chili, or soup with protein.
 Needs to be a reimbursable meal
 - 2. Sandwich or Wrap Plate Entrée is served in a wrap, pocket or between appropriate grain. Entrée should include the meat and grain and be served with appropriate fruit(s), vegetable(s), and milk. Examples: Hot Dog, Cheeseburger, Chicken Fillet, Pita Bread, Croissant, Taco, Burrito, Open Faced Sandwich.
 - Needs to be a reimbursable meal
 - **3. Ethnic Plate** The entire tray must be ethnic food.
 - Needs to be a reimbursable meal
 - **4. School Breakfast Plate** The plate should be made up of items that make a reimbursable meal for breakfast. Example: Muffin/Fruit/Milk, Breakfast Pizza/Fruit/Milk, Chicken Biscuit/Fruit/Milk, Sausage Biscuit/Juice/Milk.
 - Needs to be a reimbursable meal.
- B. Entrée Category An Entrée is defined as a combination food item intended as the main component of the meal. All entries must be accompanied by a recipe card, no size restriction. All entries should follow the K-5 Meal Pattern for 2021-2022. It is recommended that prepackaged items not be used.
 - 1. Meat/Meat Alternative Entrée Protein/grain entrée that meets the minimum USDA recommended serving size. Entrée must contain the meat / MA components. May be protein/grain, sandwich, wrap, etc. Examples: fish sandwich, pork roast/roll, Caesar chicken wrap, chicken salad/roll, ethnic entrée such as teriyaki beef/rice.

- **2. Grab n Go/Second Chance Breakfast** Breakfast entrée that meets the current minimum USDA recommended serving size. Emphasis is on the convenience and marketability. Entry must be composed of three ingredients or more. Must be displayed the way it is served and displayed on a tray.
- 3. Entrée Salad Meat/meat alternative entrée salad that meets the minimum USDA recommended serving size. Must include at least ½ cup serving of vegetable subgroups as specified in the USDA Food Buying Guide in addition to the salad mix. Examples: Taco Salad with chips/black beans/taco meat, grilled chicken with leafy greens/corn salsa.

C. Single Component Fruit/Vegetable/Grain Categories - All entries must be accompanied by a recipe card, no size restriction. Serving size must be a minimum ½ cup. (Consider a buffet style presentation also)

- 1. Commodity Fruit A commodity fruit dish that has been prepared to be served as part of a reimbursable meal. The entry must include at least two ingredients, one being the commodity fruit.
- **2.** Commodity Vegetable A commodity vegetable dish that has been prepared to be served as part of a reimbursable meal. The entry must include at least two ingredients, one being the commodity vegetable.
- 3. NCDA Farm to School Fruit or Vegetable Any Farm to School fruit or vegetable entry that has been prepared and served as part of the reimbursable meal. The entry must include at least two ingredients. The main ingredient must be the fresh fruit or vegetable product/products from the most recent Farm to School product calendar available at: http://www.ncfarmtoschool.com/htm/downloads/cal.htm .

 Participation in Farm to School program by the LEA is not a requirement for entry in this category. If the product chosen is out of season, participant may use purchased product representative of the Farm to School product.
- **4. Whole Grain Side Dish (Non-Bread)** Any grain product designed as part of the reimbursable meal. The item must meet grain minimum USDA recommended meal pattern contribution for K-5 meal pattern. Examples, rice pilaf, couscous, chicken, and rice soup (soup does not fulfill meat/meat alternate meal pattern contribution), pasta salad.

D. Bread Categories - Entries do not have to meet minimum meal pattern contributions. All entries must be accompanied by a recipe card, no size restriction.

- 1. Yeast/Sweet Yeast Breads Examples: Cinnamon buns, sweet rolls, wheat yeast rolls, cinnamon rolls.
- 2. Muffins and Biscuits
- 3. Quick Bread Examples: Banana Bread, Orange Pumpkin Loaf, Zucchini Bread or Apple breakfast bread

E. Dessert Categories – Entries do not have to meet meal pattern contributions. Entries should be homemade. A serving should be displayed for sampling. The same should be cut or part of the original entry. All entries must be accompanied by a recipe card, no size restriction.

- 1. Cookies All types: rolled, dropped and bar cookies, Brownies and Peanut Butter Delight are cookies.
- 2. Cakes Any style of cake with minimal decoration
- 3. Cupcakes Any kind of cupcakes

Culinary Arts Judging Criteria

- 1. All entries will be pre-judged to make certain they meet all the criteria.
- 2. Category winners will be determined by accumulated points based on the following criteria:

Appearance (25 points):

- Compliance with the USDA meal pattern guidelines for portion sizes for grades K-5
- Pleasing appearance
- Even coloring, shape, well proportioned

Taste (25 points):

- Well blended flavors
- Pleasing to the palate
- No overly strong flavors or "off" flavors

Presentation (25 points)

- Item is displayed neatly and merchandised properly and is attractive and has eye appeal.
- All tools, special equipment and utensils, serving/display dishes, garnishes, etc., must be supplied by the participant.
- Non-reimbursable items are not required to be displayed or typical of a school cafeteria.

Composition/Degree of Difficulty/Use of School Food (25 points)

- Cooking techniques necessary to prepare entry, logical use of time/resources
- Adherence to recipe
- Use of school food
- Commodity and Farm to School category entries must have required ingredients
- Categories requiring recipe, must have recipe that does not identify the participant or the participant's county or school.
- 3. Reimbursable entries should be typical of food served to students in the child nutrition programs and be prepared as they would be served in school cafeterias, excluding breads and desserts categories.
- 4. Foods normally served hot will be displayed in cooked form and cold foods will be displayed in the form normally used.
- 5. May display single serving or entire dish; however, table space is limited to the 12" x 18" placement place setting per entry.
- 6. Plates, entrée categories and single component categories will not be taste tested therefore judging criteria will exclude the taste criteria, with 75 total points being the highest possible accumulation for any individual entry.
- 7. ONLY ONE (1) ENTRY PER CULINARY ARTS CATEGORY, UP TO FIVE (5) CATEGORIES PER PERSON WILL BE ACCEPTED (5 total). Please read rules carefully for each category.

Culinary Arts Awards

- 1. Plaques and ribbons will be awarded to first, second and third place winners in each of the categories.
- **2. The Ralph W. Eaton Trophy** will be awarded for the best of show over-all. It will be selected from the winners of best in show complete school lunch or breakfast plate, entrée, single component, bread, and desserts categories.
- 3. The Best of Show Trophy Complete School Lunch or Breakfast Plate will be awarded for the best complete plate. It will be selected from the first-place winners in the four plate categories.
- **4.** The Best of Show Trophy Entrée will be awarded for the best entrée. It will be selected from the first-place winners in the three entrée categories
- 5. The Best of Show Trophy Single Component will be awarded to the best single component. This award will be selected from the first-place winners in the four single component categories.
- **6. The Best of Show Trophy Breads** will be awarded to the best bread. This award will be selected from the first-place winners in the three bread categories
- 7. The Best of Show Trophy Desserts will be awarded to the best dessert. This award will be selected from the first-place winners in the three dessert categories.
- 8. Judges reserve the right to limit awards if there are too few entries for adequate competition.

Division II: Creative Arts

4 Competition Categories

Creative Arts – Entries should not exceed 25" wide x 25" long x 36" high but can be smaller. Entry will be disqualified if the incorrect theme or size is used or if the size is exceeded. SIZE IS IMPORTANT!

- **A.** National School Lunch Week Decoration Use the 2021 School year theme for National School Lunch Week, "Wild About School Lunch"
- **B.** Breakfast Week Decoration Use the 2022 School year theme for National School Breakfast Week, "Take Off with School Breakfast."
- C. **Decorated Special Occasion Cakes** Sheet or tiered cakes where emphasis is on decoration. Must be entirely edible, with the exception of supports for tiered cakes.
- **D. Farm to School Display** Any display using a Farm to School product/products. Requires the use of a fresh fruit or vegetable product/products from the most recent Farm to School product calendar available at http://www.ncfarmtoschool.com/htm/downloads/cal.htm

 Porticipation in Form to School program by the LEA is not a requirement for this entegery. Fresh produce

Participation in Farm to School program by the LEA is not a requirement for this category. Fresh produce items used in the display are limited to those grown in North Carolina. For example, bananas and oranges are not allowed since they are not grown in North Carolina.

Creative Arts Rules – All Categories

- 1. All entries must be original concepts. Entries purchased from a florist, craft supplier or bakery are not eligible.
- 2. The entries must exemplify decorations actually used in the Child Nutrition programs.
- 3. Entries for National School Lunch Week and National School Breakfast Week Decorations categories will be disqualified for not using the correct theme as outlined in the category descriptions above.
- 4. Size Restrictions: Entry will be disqualified if it exceeds size restrictions. **Seasonal Category Only:** 25" Wide x 25" Long x 36" High, but can be smaller
- 5. ONLY ONE (1) ENTRY PER CREATIVE ARTS CATEGORY, PER PERSON WILL BE ACCEPTED (4 max). Please read rules carefully for each category.

Creative Arts Judging Criteria

- 1. Overall appearance 50 points
 - Pleasing appearance, skill in assembly
 - Appropriate for occasion and use in school foodservice
 - Shows originality
 - Colors appropriate, shows wise use of time and materials
- 2. Techniques and Designs 50 points
 - Demonstrates a unique design or idea
 - Creative and imaginative, consistent in design
 - Uses correct theme for 2021-2022 NSLW and 2021-2022 NSBW

Creative Arts Awards

- 1. **Plaques and ribbons** will be awarded to first, second and third place winners in each of the four categories.
- 2. **Best of Show Trophy Creative Arts** will be awarded to the best entry which will be selected from the first-place winners in each of the four Creative Arts categories.


