Legislative Update

It's so hard to believe that we are well into this school year and that the NC General Assembly 2019 Long Session has come to a close. It has been an incredibly busy year for the School Nutrition Association of NC on the legislative front. During this legislative session Senator Jackson included a provision

in the Senate Budge to eliminate student debt and a \$3 million appropriation to eliminate the \$0.40 student co-pay. It reads as follows:



STUDENT MEAL DEBT REPORT AND REDUCED-PRICE LUNCH CO-PAYS


SECTION 7.43.(a) No later than March 15, 2020, the State Board of Education shall report to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee on unpaid meal charges in local school administrative units based on data collected and provided by the North Carolina Department of Public Instruction Child Nutrition Section. All data contained in the report shall be specific to the 2018-2019 school year. At a minimum, the report shall include the following information:

- (1) The percentage of students of all grade levels in each local school administrative unit who qualify for reducedprice meals, participate in a co-payment meal plan and do not carry an unpaid meal charge.
- (2) The total amount of debt carried by each local school administrative unit related to unpaid meal charges.
- (3) A summary of approaches adopted by each local school administrative unit regarding unpaid meal charges.
- (4) Options for a uniform administration of unpaid meal charges in local school administrative units that students are not prevented from receiving nutritious meals because of an unpaid meal charge.

Representative Horne came in to play in the House and offered support of this provision. Successfully, this provision remained in the final budget that was presented to the Governor and eventually vetoed. At the time of this article being written, a vote to override this veto has not taken place. Should this override pass, the provision will come into play for the 19-20 school year. We are incredibly thankful to our General Assembly members for recognizing the needs of food insecure students across North Carolina and their desire to make a positive change on their behalf. SNA-NC intends to continue the building of these relationships and form new ones throughout the General Assembly. As part of SNA-NC's strategic plan, the PP&L Committee intends to continue efforts





The SNA-NC Plan of Action is a tool that we use at the state and local level to guide our focus for the Association. Objective:

Strategies:

- 2. Continue to enhance the quality of educational programming at meetings and expand on ways to leverage this content for wider reach.
- 3. Develop opportunities for professional development such as food waste, sustainability and cultural intelligence/diversity and inclusion for SNA-NC members.
- 4. Promote the SNA Certificate Program as a way to create a career path and grow professionally in School Nutrition especially among employees, managers and directors who do not meet SNS academic requirements:
 - Track newest Certificate Level 2 members for its effectiveness in professional growth.

Goal 2 – Advocacy and Public Image

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
