February 12, 2020 - Pinehurst, NC

The Board of Director meeting was called to order at 2:00 p.m. by *Fred Gilbert, President*. The Mission Statement and Vision of SNA-NC was stated by *Fred Gilbert, President*. The Thought for the Day was given by *Kristen Bealler, President Elect*.

BUSINESS AGENDA

Roll call was completed by Janet Johnson, Secretary-Treasurer.

Minutes for the September 2019 Board Meetings were approved. Committee members for the following were approved: Membership (*Stephanie Bryan*), Endowment (*Ruth McDowell*), Marketing (*Liz Roesel*) and Industry (*Joanne Kirven*).

A budget update was provided by *Janet Johnson*, *Secretary Treasurer*, followed by discussion of routine board business as follows:

Mary-Catherine Talton, PP & L Chair provided a legislative recap.

Kristen Bealler, President Elect provided updates on the SNA-NC Annual Conference.

Dawn Roth, Executive Director, provided an update on the 2020 SNA-NC Industry Conference and potential date of February 2022 for the next conference. The new Innovative Stations were well received by both vendors and participants.

Kristen Bealler, made a motion to amend the Standing Rule 4.a.3 to change limit of two candidates and one alternative candidate to allow up to five candidates to run for each office to be voted upon by the membership. The motion was seconded by *Amy Tant* and passed.

Mary Gourley of Union County was selected for the Future Leaders Program.

Ashley Ellington (CORE Group), Penny Fine (Gilbert Foods) and Liz Roesel (SEA Level Social) were selected to be on the ballot for the NC Industry Representative.

- Arrow Article Deadline Dawn Roth, Executive Director, provided the Arrow Article list with all upcoming deadlines.

OUR MISSION STATEMENT

Educate, empower, and advocate for the school nutrition professionals to advance the accessibility, quality, and integrity of school nutrition programs

As we find ourselves in unprecedented times we have to keep our focus on our mission and vision for the betterment of the children and students that we nourish and assist in educating. As we journey through unknown waters of alternate learning models, revised regulations, and whether or not we will even see children in our schools, I know we will find success in discovering creative and unique ways to reach our students and their nutritional needs. We must also remember to fulfill the needs of our teams, our members, and ourselves when facing all of these unknowns. We must continue to educate outside stakeholders, empower our members, and advocate for our programs.

The SNA–NC 2020-2021 Plan of Action is a tool for use at the state level as well as within local associations. The SNA-NC Board of Directors, which includes SNA-NC District Directors, standing committees and advisory members, along with our local chapters work together to accomplish this plan. I hope everyone will support these goals and build programs and meetings around them. As always, our focus is on our membership and sustaining our ability to meet our vision and mission of our organization!

GOAL 1 – PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT:

School nutrition professionals will continually improve their knowledge and skill to administer, manage, deliver, and sustain successful school meal programs.

STRATEGIES:

- 1. Enhance the quality of educational programming at meetings and expand on ways to leverage this content for wider reach to more SNA-NC members.
- Provide training, innovative ideas, best practices, and resources to help SNA members sustain and grow school nutrition programs considering the COVID-19 pandemic.
- 3. Promote the certificate program as a way to grow professionally in school nutrition especially among, employees, managers and directors who do not meet SNS academic requirements.

- Monitor and support USDA's and Congress' efforts to simplify overly burdensome child nutrition mandates to improve efficiencies and reduce costs and work with USDA and Congress to implement new mandates.
- 3. Implement new strategies, as needed, to support child nutrition program advocacy and emerging issues, such as Universal Meals, in light of COVID-19.
- 4. Collect and share successful advocacy stories for members to utilize in their advocacy work.
- 5. Monitor state legislative issues, especially those addressing COVID-19, and support advocacy efforts on those issues, as needed.
- 6. Serve as a trusted resource and utilize all media outlets to educate and promote school nutrition programs (NSBW and NSLW) to the public, policy makers, and all stakeholders.

GOAL 3 – MEMBERSHIP AND COMMUNITY

School nutrition programs nationwide will be strengthened through the engagement, leadership and collaboration among SNA-NC members, chapter affiliates, allied partners and other stakeholders.

STRATEGIES:

- 1. Explore alternative membership models to ensure long-term sustainability and relevance for all member segments.
- 2. Increase collaboration between SNA-NC Board and the Leadership Development Committee to improve targeted recruitment efforts and monitor key demographic trends among volunteer leaders, to create a more inclusive environment for SNA-NC members of different demographic groups.

GOAL 4 – GOVERNANCE & OPERATIONS

SNA-NC will have a nimble governance structure that is aligned with the strategic plan and reflects contemporary business practices.

STRATEGIES:

1. Recruit diverse leadership talent for open elected and appointed SNA-NC positions.

Legislative Update

What a spring and summer! The Legislative Committee has been hard at work since the news breaking of a pandemic and then upon the quick school closure. Over the last several months the committee has had several virtual meetings as a team, as well as with many community partner groups and Legislative staff themselves. We have seen many positives come out of this storm on the legislative side both in Raleigh and in Washington DC! Some of these successes for North Carolina specifically have been the ability to utilize yellow school buses to serve students in the midst of the pandemic, \$75 million specified for School Nutrition for Pandemic Relief, and the long awaited \$3.9 million allocated to eliminate the \$0.40 copay for students receiving reduced priced lunch in the 2020-2021 school year. At the federal level we have seen many waivers granted, and extended, through USDA along with many conversations with Congress and the Senate around school meals leading to the introduction of the Pandemic Child Hunger Prevention Act, as well as many letters from our representatives in the Legislative Branch to USDA Secretary Sonny Perdue. All of these conversations and requests federally led to the long awaited and worked for announcement made on August 31 by Secretary Sonny Perdue issuing waivers to extend the SFSP and SSO through December 31, 2020! What a success! Children everywhere will feel the positive effects of this much celebrated decision! This may be one of the most uncertain and unpredictable times in our career, but it has led to long desired program awareness!

November is right around the corner and we, as the Public Policy and Legislative (PP&L) Committee are encouraging you to get out and vote! Your voice, both on Election Day and every day thereafter, is so incredibly important to your program, your coworkers, and your students! I have said many times since becoming your PP&L Chair that it's important that we don't sit back and allow the voice of a few be the voice of the many. We need your voice! Your students need your voice! So get out and vote and then let's begin forming relationships with our elected officials so they become well informed on our programs and our student's needs, pandemic or not we need them recognizing the need for our programs.

Speaking of letting your voice be heard, what better way to do this than to join us in Washington DC March 7-9, 2021 and have the opportunity to meet face to face with policy makers and discuss your program and our students' needs! This is truly a one of a kind conference and one that makes a huge impact on behalf of our programs! We would love to see you there!
