North Carolina Alliance for Healthy School Meals for All Coalition is dedicated to get school meals at no cost for all our students through working with allied organizations to educate our Legislators on how that would be a benefit to all. If you want to participate in their zoom meetings, you are welcome to. You would need to contact them at admin@ncallianceforhealth.org to request to get on the future zoom meetings. Also, the LAC (SNA Legislative Action Conference) is coming up in March 2023. This is the year that we need a large delegation to attend and help educate our NC Legislators. We have the reauthorization of our program that needs our support.

We are also getting a lot of local, regional, and national press about meal charges lately. We need to continue doing interviews on school meal charges if that affects your schools, the nutritious meals we serve, and how we are part of each student's educational success. Please do not shy away from an interview. You can do them because you know your role in feeding our students.

My last request is for you to do some homework and learn who your new Legislators are in the State and Federal Government. Go ahead and invite them to visit your schools. Show them what you offer your students, what you need to have an efficient kitchen to prep those meals and what your staff needs to be successful in their position. Tell them your story. Reach out to me if you know any of our new NC Legislators personally and are willing to help us advocate for our students and staff.

2023 National School Breakfast Week

National School Breakfast Week (NSBW) celebrates the importance of a nutritious school breakfast in fueling students for success. This year’s NSBW SNA theme is **“Dig Into School Breakfast.”** This theme celebrates the many ways that your students can “construct” a healthy meal that will serve as a solid “foundation” for “towering” achievements at school and in life.

NSBW is a weeklong celebration of the National School Breakfast Program, established in 1975 by an act of Congress. Schools across the country will find ways to celebrate breakfast in 2023 with special menu items, events, and fun activities designed for all students. This year’s theme is also ideal for conveying messages about the roles of different nutrients in building a healthy body.

Studies show that children who eat school breakfast are more likely to:

- ✓ Have better attendance rates
- ✓ Reach higher levels of achievement in reading and math
- ✓ Score higher on standardized tests
- ✓ Have better concentration and memory
- ✓ Have fewer behavioral problems
- ✓ Be more alert and maintain a healthy weight

The National School Breakfast Program serves nearly **12 million nutritious breakfasts** to students across the country every school day. These breakfasts tend to be more nutritious than the average breakfast a child gets from home or a convenient fast-food restaurant.

Making NSBW a fun-filled occasion at your school will get students excited about your breakfast program and increase participation! Offer a taste test of new breakfast menu items and talk about the nutritive benefits they get from certain foods, such as strong bones from the calcium in milk and energy from complex carbohydrates in whole grains.

Need more ideas? Dig into #NSBW23 marketing resources from SNA and a toolkit packed with ideas for engaging students, advice for gaining valuable media attention, customizable templates, all official #NSBW23 artwork, social media shareables and more!

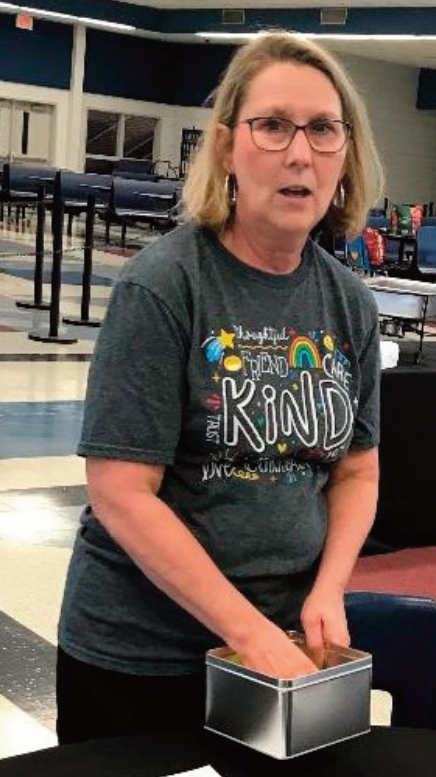
District VII Meeting October 3, 2022

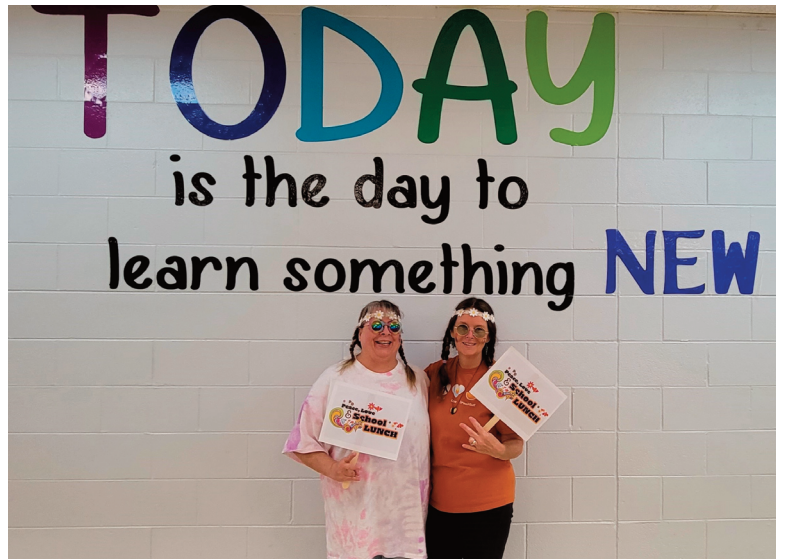

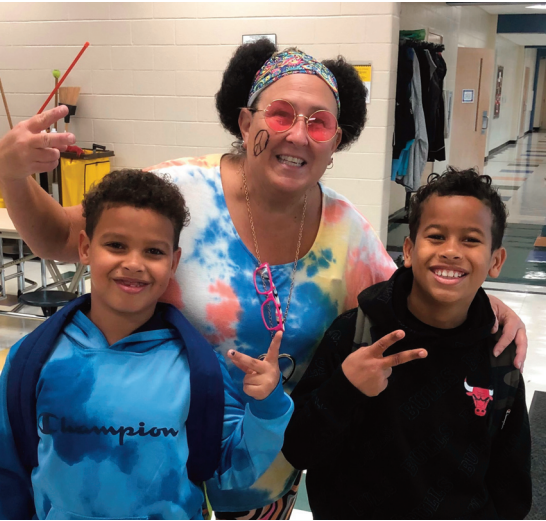

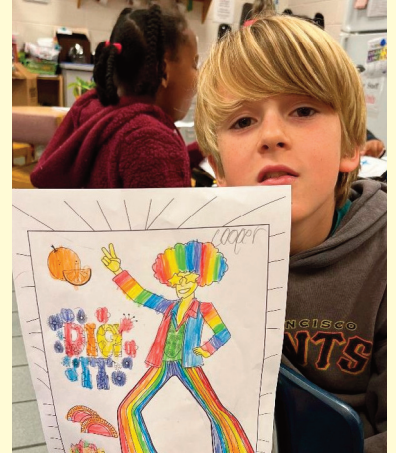

We hope that this meeting will allow you to fully understand the process. Also, new this year is a Culinary/Creative Arts mini session that we encourage those that are new to the competition and those that have competed many years to attend and gain more understanding of the process. We hope you will join us, and we can’t wait to see you “Stir Up Your Gifts”.

Culinary & Creative Arts Competition

Mission Statement

The mission of the School Nutrition Association of North Carolina Culinary/Creative Arts Competition is to attractively display and merchandise foods and creative decorations used in the operation of the North Carolina Child Nutrition Programs.

General Information for all Participants

- Participant must be a SNA-NC member and pre-registered for the SNA-NC Annual Conference
- Entries must be in the name of an individual member. School entries are not permitted
- Entry forms must have the correct contact information (phone & email) and the print is legible (Please PRINT)
- There are 5 Culinary Categories and each category has 3 to 4 subcategories. There are 4 Creative Arts Categories. You can only select 1 subcategory out of each Culinary Category and can select all 4 Creative Arts Categories. *Ex: Dessert Category -- If you select cookies, then you can't select cakes as another option.*
- *Entries are due by May 19, 2023.*
- Only the individual competitor will be permitted into the setup area. Please give careful consideration to your entries this year and make sure you allow yourself enough time for setup.

Before submitting your entry, please make sure you understand the requirements for the category you are entering. If you have any questions on a category, please email them to jamie.narron@wilsonschoolsnc.net

Some of the categories must follow the K-5 meal pattern. Below are the K-5 meal pattern requirements for your convenience. Please note that these are the required minimums per day.

Division 1: Culinary Arts

5 Categories: 17 Sub-Categories

Category 1: School Lunch or Breakfast Plate Category

All entries should follow the K-5 Meal Pattern for 2022-2023 and must represent a complete reimbursable meal. Food components may be weighed or measured. No recipe card needed.

- A. Lunch/Entree Meal** - Entree meal is served with appropriate fruit(s), vegetable(s), grain, and milk.
Example: BBQ Chicken, Pizza, and Soup.
- B. Sandwich or Wrap Plate** - Entree is served in a bun, wrap, or between appropriate grain. The entree should include the meat and grain and be served with appropriate fruit(s), vegetable(s), grain, and milk.
Example: Hot Dog, Cheeseburger, and Taco.
- C. Ethnic Plate** - Entree must be ethnic food and is served with appropriate fruit(s), vegetable(s), grain, and milk. *Example: Orange Chicken with Vegetable Fried Rice*
- D. School Breakfast Plate** - Entree is served with appropriate fruit(s) and milk.
Example: Muffin, Breakfast Pizza, and Biscuit.

Category 2: Entree Category

An entree is defined as a combination food item intended as the main component of the meal. All entries should follow the minimum USDA serving size for 2022-2023. **A recipe card, no card size limit, is required for this category.** No pre-packaged items should be used.

- A. Meat/Meat Alternative Entree** - Entree must contain an M/MA component and may include grain.
Example: fish sandwich, chicken salad and roll, teriyaki beef and rice.
- B. Grab & Go/Second Chance Breakfast** - This entry must follow the K-12 breakfast meal pattern as well as emphasize convenience and marketability. It must be displayed the way it is served and then displayed on a tray.
- C. Entree Salad** - Entree salad that meets the meal pattern contribution for K-5 for M/MA and salad mix. The salad must also include an additional ½ cup serving of any vegetable.
Example: Taco salad with chips/black beans/taco meat, grilled chicken salad on top of salad mix with corn salsa.

Category 3: Single Component Fruit/Vegetable/Grain Category

Serving size must be at least ½ cup and meet the meal pattern contribution for K-5. **A recipe card, no card size limit, is required for this category.**

- A. Commodity Fruit** - Entry must include at least two ingredients, with one being a commodity fruit, that could be served as part of a reimbursable meal.
- B. Commodity Vegetable** - Entry must include at least two ingredients, with one being a commodity vegetable, that could be served as part of a reimbursable meal.
- C. NCDA Farm to School Fruit or Vegetable** - Entry must include at least two ingredients, with the main ingredient being a fresh fruit or vegetable product, that could be served as part of a reimbursable meal. The Farm to School fruit or vegetable must be from the most recent Farm to School product calendar at: Delivery Calendar | NC Farm to School
- D. Whole Grain (Non-Bread) Side Dish** - A grain product that could be served as part of a reimbursable meal.
Example: Rice pilaf, couscous, pasta salad.

Category 4: Bread Category

Entries do not have to meet meal pattern contributions. **A recipe card, no card size limit, is required for this category.** A serving should be displayed for sampling and should be cut from or part of the original entry.

- A. Yeast/Sweet Yeast Breads** - *Example: Cinnamon rolls or buns, yeast rolls*
- B. Muffins & Biscuits** - *Example: Blueberry muffins, buttermilk biscuits*
- C. Quick Bread** - *Example: Banana bread, zucchini bread*

Category 5: Dessert Category

Entries do not have to meet meal pattern contributions. A **recipe card, no card size limit, is required for this category.** A serving should be displayed for sampling and should be cut from or part of the original entry.

- A. **Cookies** - Example: Rolled, dropped, bar cookies, brownies, peanut butter delights
- B. **Cakes** - Any style of cake with minimal decorations
- C. **Cupcakes** - Any kind of cupcake

Division 2: Creative Arts

4 Categories

Entries should be less than or equal to 25" wide x 25" long x 36" high. Size is important and entries will be disqualified if the incorrect theme or size is used. All entries must be original concepts and cannot be purchased from florist, craft supplier, or bakery as those will not be eligible.

- A. **National School Lunch Week Decoration** - Use the 2022 National School Lunch Week Theme "Peace, Love, & School Lunch"
- B. **National School Breakfast Week Decoration** - Use the 2023 National School Breakfast Week Theme "Dig into School Breakfast"
- C. **Decorated Special Occasion Cake** - Sheet or tiered cakes where emphasis is on decoration. Cake must be entirely edible with the expectation of support for tiered cakes.
- D. **Farm to School Display** - Any display using Farm to School products from the most recent Farm to School product calendar at: Delivery Calendar | NC Farm to School (Participation in the Farm to School program by the LEA is not a requirement for this category. Fresh produce items used in the display are limited to those grown in North Carolina. Bananas and oranges are not allowed since they are grown in North Carolina but are not on the Farm to School product calendar.)
